# FATHER'S COLUMN

"Therefore, stay awake, for you know neither the day nor the hour."

What makes us drowsy and falling asleep? Exhaustion? Boredom? Inactivity? What keeps us alert and awake? An interesting and challenging task indeed. Engaging interaction with persons we enjoy or who inspire us... The pressure of a deadline...

What keeps us alert and awake for the Second Coming of Christ? The task of active waiting... The engaging interaction with Christ and the members of his Body... The deadline of Christ's return at the end of time.

"The kingdom of heaven will be like" the community of the Church awaiting the return of Christ, the Bridegroom, in final glory. Some of our brothers and sisters in the community are wise. They are alert, awake, prepared, engaged, persistent. Some others in the community are foolish. They are drowsy, inattentive, thoughtless, detached, lethargic.

When Christ comes at midnight, the time of deepest darkness, the wise will meet the Light with their light and will be admitted to the wedding feast. The foolish will remain locked outside in the darkness.

As we await the coming of Christ, we need to admit that sometimes we are wise and sometimes, foolish.

We are wise when we make our daily choices in line with the Gospel values, when we cultivate a strong relationship with Christ through prayer and attentiveness to the needs of others, when we remain faithful despite the ordinary ups and downs of Gospel living.

# Year of the Eucharist Reflections

#### How often may I receive the Eucharist?

The Church teaches that one must attend and participate in Mass at least once a week, on Sundays (or the Saturday vigil) and on other Holy Days of Obligation. One should receive the Eucharist when in the state of grace and having proper disposition each time one is at Mass, but one must at least receive the Eucharist once a year. It is highly recommended to attend Mass and to receive the Eucharist daily. One may receive the Eucharist twice in one day when the second time is at a full Mass that one attends and participates in.

### Are there any other times I may receive the Eucharist besides at Mass?

Yes, you may receive the Eucharist during the week at a Communion Service in the place of a Mass or when a minister brings the Eucharist to you when you are sick or in the hospital.

#### What if I am not able to make it to Sunday Mass for a serious reason, or if it is not convenient during the week?

The Church teaches that when we are not able to receive the Sacrament of the Eucharist for a serious reason, we may instead receive the Lord in a spiritual communion, which, with proper disposition, can be as effective in grace as receiving the Sacramental Eucharist Himself.

We may receive spiritual communions as often as we would like, and may do so through a prayer asking for the Lord's special presence in a "spiritual communion."

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

With a population of over 1.1 million inhabitants, the Diocese of Springfield in Illinois has tens of thousands of people in our midst living in poverty. These men, women and children seldom make the headlines. However, their needs are real and deserve our prayer, action, and financial support.
